Planning a Beach Management Program \implies Planning for Retirement:

- 1. Do we need to Plan?
- 2. Who can help us with Planning?
- 3. What can we afford to Plan for?
- 4. Develop a Plan that fits your budget and goals,
- 5. Adjust the Plan as conditions change.

Practical Shoreline Protection Program Implementation

Keys to Success:

- Begin putting money away early (Dare County, New Hanover County)
- Begin developing a plan and working on permits early
- Determine who benefits from the project (Cost sharing partners: oceanfront owners, other property owners in the Town, County, State, etc.)
- Look for options that may provide cost savings

Project Costs:

- Project planning must occur 1st.
- Kitty Hawk Project:
 - 4.0 Miles Long
 - 90 cy/ft.
 - Anticipated Total Cost \$18,856,000
- Town of Southern Shores is 3.7 miles long
