




The racers had a beautiful day to show off their hard work and have fun doing it.

# **2016 Officer of the Year**



The Officer of the Year is chosen by their peers, and is based upon numerous criteria, some of which includes professionalism, dedication, going above and beyond the call of duty on a daily basis. Chief Kole jokingly says, Senior Officer Jones looks too young to be a Senior Patrol Officer, but he earned that title. Ryan even worked harder to be chosen as our "Officer of the Year".

Ryan Jones is a Senior Patrol Officer with the Town of Southern Shores. He has been an officer with the town since 2013.

In 2012, Ryan moved to the Outer Banks from Pittsburgh, PA where he obtained his Master's degree from Slippery Rock University in Resource Management and Law Enforcement.

In addition to being a Police Officer, Ryan is also a certified Emergency Medical Technician.

When not working, Ryan and his wife Caitlin can usually be found enjoying the outdoors kayaking or paddle boarding.

# Chief's Statement

2016 was another busy year for our officers. We saw a slight decrease in calls for service compared to last year. Once again, July proved to be the busiest month with a total of 1,130 calls for service and November being the least busy with a total of 730. Officers responded to an average of just under 925 calls for service per month. We had a slight increase in Motor Vehicle Accidents compared to last year with July (8) and August (11) being the highest months. The location with the highest number of motor vehicle accidents continues to be on NC12 (Duck Rd) with a total of 31. The highest number of accidents occurred between 1:00pm and 4:00pm with a total of 20. We saw a slight decrease in Reported Crimes with 197 compared to 205 last year. We had a 69% increase in Criminal Arrests compared to last year; 31 of those arrests were for DWI. Traffic Citations were slightly lower while Warning Citations saw a significant increase. Much of this increase can be directly attributed to the fact that we continue to conduct numerous saturation patrols in areas where traffic tends to increase significantly. Some of those locations included South and East Dogwood, Hickory, Sea Oats, NC12, Wax Myrtle, Hillcrest, Juniper and Chicahauk. This year we were down an officer for approximately 10 weeks, who was out on medical leave and even though we were shorthanded, we were still able to provide the same high level of service for our community and those visiting. Officer Tracy Mann, who is our School Resource Officer, continues to interact with the students and staff daily, which includes teaching classes regarding anti-bullying and internet safety as well as being another resource for the teachers to utilize. Officer Mann spends countless hours of her own time assisting and participating in numerous after school programs throughout the school year. It was our goal to have Officer Mann certified as a DARE Instructor for the 2016 school year. Officer Mann attended DARE Instructor School and received her instructor certification and has already implemented the DARE program into the Kitty Hawk Elementary School. Patrol Officers continue to visit and walk through the school daily. Officers also continue to be proactive by patrolling the neighborhoods and increasing their foot patrols which result in the officers getting out of the patrol cars more frequently and walking the business districts.

We continue to train and educate our officers; this year was no exception. We conducted several "Active Shooter" training segments at Kitty Hawk Elementary School that included joint training with Kitty Hawk Police Department, Duck Police Department and Southern Shores Volunteer Fire Department. We spent hundreds of hours in training that included, firearms, Taser, juvenile issues, domestic violence issues, officer safety and supervisory training, just to name a few.

I would like to personally thank all the members of the police department for the hard work and dedication each of them exhibits daily, and a special thanks to our Administrative Assistant Jennifer Couture for putting this report together. I would also like to thank the Town Manager for his sincere support and assistance as well as the Town Council and Community for their continued support.
