Chief's Statement

2019 saw a slight a decrease in calls for service over the prior year. There was a decrease of 412 CFS's (calls for service), most of which were house/property check request reductions. Officers responded to an average of 1410 calls for service per month. The total number of "reportable" motor vehicle accidents decreased by (5) five compared to last year. August was the highest month for reportable traffic accidents with a total of 12 and March being the lowest with (0) zero traffic accidents. The highest traffic accident location continues to be (NC12) Duck Rd. with 29, which is 7 more than last year. The time of day with the highest number of traffic accidents was between 1pm and 4pm with a total of 16 crashes and second highest was between 4pm and 7pm with 16 crashes. Reported crimes show a slight decrease compared to last year. Traffic citations issued showed a slight increase and written warning citations saw a significant increase of 475 citations compared to last year. Some reasons for the increase; are the fact that we had less CFS's, which allowed officer more time to enforce traffic laws in town, we also provided overtime slots for traffic enforcement, due to manpower shortage. This included saturation patrols in specific hot spots throughout the town during the summer months.

It is important to note that even though we saw slight reductions in some areas, and significant increases in other areas, we were short two (2) police officers for almost the entire year, this included the summer months. I commend our police officers, even with the significant shortage of manpower through most of the year including the summer season, our officers stepped up and continued to provide exceptional police services to both the residents and vacationing visitors. Officer Tracy Mann, our School Resource Officer, continues to interact with the students and staff daily, this includes teaching classes regarding anti-bullying, DARE and internet safety as well as being another resource for the teachers to utilize. Officer Mann spends countless hours of her own time assisting and participating in numerous after-school programs throughout the school year. Officer Mann continues to teach Drug Abuse Resistance Education and several hundred children have successfully graduated from this class over the last four years. Officer Mann is assigned to patrol in the summer months when school is in recess. This time also provides her the opportunity to attend training and update her required certifications, that she is unable to complete during the school year. Patrol officers also visit and walk through the school daily. Officers continue to be proactive by patrolling the neighborhoods and increasing their foot patrols which result in the officers getting out of the patrol cars more frequently and walking the business districts.

We continue to provide training and educational incentives to our officers; this year was no exception. We continue to keep up to date on "Active Shooter" training and techniques, we continue to train physically, defensively, this includes firearms training, as well as defensive tactics, we also participate in classroom training and on-line training throughout the year.

I would like to personally thank all the members of the police department for the hard work and dedication they exhibit each day, and a special thanks to our Administrative Assistant Jennifer Couture for assisting in putting this report together. I would also like to thank the Town Manager for his sincere support and assistance as well as the Town Council and Community for their continued support.




Incidents/Crimes Reported

Incident - one or more offenses committed by the same offender, or group of offenders acting in concert, at the same time and place.

Offense – all crimes that have occurred within a single incident with which an offender may be charged.

Example: Police may be called to a residence in which someone broke into a home to commit a theft and in the process assaulted the homeowner and upon fleeing stole a car. This is reported as one incident in which three separate offenses occurred.


Criminal Arrests / Charges

Arrest – the physical detainment of an individual suspected of violating criminal laws. Multiple offenses from one or more incidents may be charged in the course of one arrest.

Charges – the separate offenses in which a suspect in charged with for violation of criminal laws during an arrest.

Example: Police arrest John Doe for Breaking & Entering. There were three charges for Breaking & Entering as well as charges for Larceny from three separate Incidents, but they were all recorded as one arrest.






