

2007 was a busy year for the Southern Shores Police Department. As always, we are seeing lots of changes and most of them good. The department saw a new Chief of Police sworn in as well as the addition of several new officers to the roster. We are now full staff and hope to stay that way. We, unfortunately, lost our Chaplain, David Clift as he moved on to new challenges of his own. Hopefully, this year will bring us a new Chaplain as we can always use a little of the Good Lord on our side. As we have sought to

overcome tragedy within our ranks, we have pulled together and tried to bring the citizens of Southern Shores a higher level of service. We have implemented some new community policing strategies as well as continued to offer many of the same programs that have been in place for some time. We have also tried to educate the public on what we do and somewhat lift the veil of mystery that sometimes surrounds law enforcement. As always, our fundamental purpose has been equitable enforcement of the law and the safety and security of our citizens. In 2007, the Southern Shores Police Department responded to 10,213 calls for service. The highest number of calls came from the officers themselves conducting security checks of residences and businesses in order to maintain a proactive vigilance. We investigated 173 cases, made 57 arrests (23 DWIs), wrote 761 citations (209 of which were for speeding), 434 warning tickets and 437 ordinance violations. Additionally we investigated 44 accidents

Interizing Your Home

t's a good idea to winterize your home to save energy and to save yourself a headache for those homes that are not occuduring the winter months. Here are a few tips on how to y for the cold weather...

Winterizing Your Home - Interior

- Check your heating system and have it service by a qualified technician. - Remember to change out the filters in your furnace according to the instruction in the manual.
- Clean the dryer exhaust duct and heating vents Cleaning out your dryer vent prevents lint from building up and therefore decreases the risk for a fire.
- Inspect the washing machine hoses If they begin to look frayed it is best to replace them now to prevent leaks and water damage to your home.
- Check your smoke detectors & replace batteries Make sure you know how to replace the batteries and how to reconnect your smoke detector. It is generally best to replace these batteries annually.
- Locate all water shut off valves In freezing temperatures it is a good idea to let your faucets drip a little to keep them from freezing.
- Review safe fireplace operation located in the manufacturer's operation guide.
- Check garage overhead door and service per the instructions in the manufacturer's manual. - Learn how to manually operate your garage door in case of a power failure

Winterizing Your Home - Exterior

- Disconnect all hoses from the faucets "Frost free" faucets can cause a broken water line if the water in the hose freezes and expands into the pipe
- Drain the hose bibs & your sprinkler system
- Install insulation covers on all exterior faucets Available at any hardware store - During freezing temperatures, if the hose bibs / faucets are exposed you can run the risk of freezing pipes.
- Keep trees and shrubbery trimmed During severe wind and rainstorms the wind can blow so hard that weak and smaller tree limbs can break off and be hurled at your home at great speeds, causing damage to your home when they hit.
- Clean the roof and gutters Gutters that are too full of debris can back up and eventually cause a leak into your home. It is best to make sure that the gutters and downspouts are free of debris.
- Check for roof leaks
- Check the flashing and vents for warps or holes.
- Learn where the water shut off valves are located & how to turn them off
- Check the caulking around windows and doors
- Replace weather stripping if needed
- Clear the yard drains

Tips for SAFE WINTER **DRIVING**

The Three P's of Safe Winter Driving.

PREPARE for the trip; PROTECT yourself; and **PREVENT** crashes on the road.

PREPARE **PROTECT YOURSELF**

Maintain Your Car: Check battery and tire tread, keep your windows clear, put nofreeze fluid in the washer reservoir, check your anti-

Have On Hand: flashlight, jumper cables, abrasive mate- Practice Cold Weather Drivrial (sand, kitty litter, even floor mats), shovel, snow brush and ice scraper, warning devices (like flares) and blankets. For long trips, add food and water, medication and cell phone.

Stopped or Stalled? Stay with your car, don't over exert, put bright markers on antenna or windows and shine dome light, and, if you run your car, clear exhaust pipe and run it just enough to stay warm.

Plan Your Route: Allow plenty of time (check the weather and leave early if necessary), be familiar with the maps/directions, and let others know your route and arrival time.

- * During daylight, rehearse maneuvers slowly on the ice or snow in an empty lot
- * Steer into a skid
- * Know what your brakes will do: stomp on antilock brakes, pump non-antilock
- * Stopping distances are longer on water-covered ice and ice
- * Don't idle for a long time with the windows up or in an enclosed space
- * Buckle up and use child safety seats properly
- * Never place a rear-facing infant seat in front of an air bag
- * Children 12 and under are much safer in the back seat
- * Sit back 10 inches from an air bag

PREVENT CRASHES

Drugs and alcohol never mix with driving

- Slow down and increase distances between cars
- * Keep your eyes open for pedestrians walking in the road
- * Avoid fatigue Get plenty of rest before the trip, stop at least every three hours, and rotate drivers if possible
