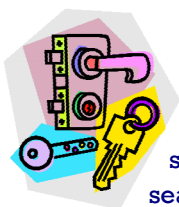

### Did You Know?

#### § 14-129.2. Unlawful to take sea oats.

(a) It is unlawful to dig up, pull up, or take from the land of another or from any public domain the whole or any part of any Sea Oats (*Uniola paniculata*) without the consent of the owner of that land.

(b) Any person convicted of violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for each offense.

## Smart trick-or-treating is

- Going trick-or-treating with friends and bringing along a grown-up.
- Using make-up instead of a mask so that you can see.
- Making a map of your trick-or-treat route for your parents.
- Staying in your own neighborhood.
- Not walking in the street. Stop, look, and listen at every corner.
- Showing respect for other people and their property.
- Not stopping at dark houses.
- Checking your treats with a parent before you eat them.
- Not going inside a stranger's house, no matter what.

## For the Parents

- Make sure your kids dress up safely
- Make sure costumes are flame-retardant so the little ones aren't in danger near burning jack-o-lanterns.

• Keep costumes short to prevent trips, falls, and other bumps in the night.

• Try make-up instead of a mask. Masks can be hot and uncomfortable and they can obstruct a child's vision -- a dangerous thing when kids are crossing streets and going up and down steps.

• Make sure kids wear light colors or put reflective tape on their costumes.

## Make trick-or-treating trouble free

• Create map of safe trick-or-treat route.

• Trick-or-treaters should always be in groups so they aren't a tempting target for real-life goblins. Parents should accompany young children.

• Make sure older kids trick-or-treat with friends. Together, map out a safe route so you will know where they will be. Tell them to stop only at familiar homes where the outside lights are on.

• Try to get your kids to trick-or-treat while it's still light out. If it's dark, make sure someone has a flashlight and pick well-lighted streets.

• Make sure kids know never to enter a stranger's house or car.

• Keep a safe distance from moving cars.

## Treats

• It's hard for kids hold back from eating their treats until they get home. One way to keep trick-or-treaters from digging in while they're still out is to feed them a meal or a snack beforehand.

• Check out all candy in a well-lighted place when your trick-or-treater gets home.

• What to eat? Only unopened candies and other treats that are in original wrappers. Don't forget to inspect fruit and homemade goodies for anything suspicious. By all means, remind kids not to eat everything at once or they'll be feeling pretty ghoulish for awhile!

Halloween can be a lot of fun for parents and kids alike -- if everybody remembers the tricks and the treats of playing it safe.
